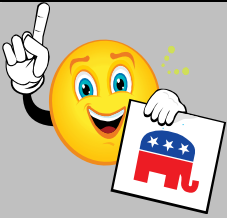
KnowItNow is a 24/7 online reference service of the State Library of Ohio. You have 24 hour access to librarians to help answer any questions regarding your homework.

- *Pay attention to deadlines and dates.
- *Most colleges require at least three, if not four years of studies in math, English, science and social studies as well as two years of a foreign language.
- *Your grades are important as is difficulty of your coursework.
- *Participate in extracurricular activities is also a good idea. Activities such as volunteer work, speech, drama or debate clubs and sports indicate a willingness to cooperate with others and put forth the effort needed to succeed.
- *Take the necessary assessment tests. Get with your guidance counselors regarding the ACT and SAT tests. We can even help with the costs of these tests.
- *Start looking for grants and scholarships as soon as possible.
